# RNA COVID-19 Vaccine (Pfizer or Moderna)

Vaccination, the best protection

Vaccination is the best protection against COVID-19 and its complications, in addition to other measures such as physical distancing, wearing a medical mask or face covering, and hand washing.

#### The vaccine

Vaccination is the best protection against COVID-19 and its complications. Pfizer vaccine and Moderna vaccine are approuved for people age 12 and over. For young people aged 12 to 29 years, Pfizer vaccine is recommended.

Pfizer vaccine or Moderna vaccine requires 2 doses. A booster dose of either vaccine is recommended for adults and adolescents who are at high risk of complications from COVID-19 or living in a restricted community facility (e.g.: refuge). It can also be offered to adolescents in good health who wish to receive it. A 2<sup>nd</sup> booster dose is also recommended for certain people at high risk of complications from COVID-19 (e.g.: resident in CHLSDs).

In adults, the efficacy of Pfizer and Moderna vaccines after 2 doses is 20-30% against infections caused by the Omicron variant. After the booster dose, efficacy is approximately 60-75% against infections caused by the Omicron variant and over 80% against hospitalizations. The booster dose is needed to further reduce transmission and increase protection, including protection against the Omicron variant.

People on dialysis or with weakened immune systems should receive 3 doses of vaccine, followed by 2 booster doses.

A booster dose of Pfizer or Moderna vaccine is also recommended for adults who received AstraZeneca or Covishield vaccine. Administration of a Pfizer or Moderna vaccine after a dose of AstraZeneca or Covishield vaccine does not appear to cause more reactions than 2 doses of RNA vaccine. However, people who received AstraZeneca or Covishield vaccine may choose to continue their vaccination with AstraZeneca or Covishield vaccine.

For people who had a positive test for COVID-19 before the 1<sup>st</sup> dose of vaccine, 1 dose is required followed by a booster dose. There is no risk in giving more than 2 doses of vaccine to someone who has had COVID-19, but the additional dose does not protect them more. For people who had COVID-19 when they were given the 1<sup>st</sup> dose or after, at least 2 doses are required. People on dialysis or with weakened immune systems should receive 3 doses of vaccine, followed by 2 booster doses.

### Symptoms after vaccination

Some symptoms may be caused by the vaccine (e.g., pain at the injection site). Other problem may occur by chance and are not related to the vaccine (e.g., cold, gastro). Most reactions are harmless and do not last long. Local reactions can occur up to 8 days after vaccination. Reactions are less common among people age 55 and over. They are slightly less frequent after the 1<sup>st</sup> dose and after the booster dose than after the 2<sup>nd</sup> dose.

In a minority of those vaccinated, vaccine-induced reactions that prevent daily activities for 1 or 2 days may occur. Reactions include fatigue, headache, and muscle or joint pain. They can occur up to 8 days after vaccination. These reactions are less common among the elderly. They occur more often after the 2<sup>nd</sup> dose.

Pfizer and Moderna vaccines cannot cause COVID-19 because they do not contain the SARS-CoV-2 virus that causes the disease. However, people who have been in contact with the virus could still develop COVID-19.

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#### Safety of the vaccine

Pfizer and Moderna vaccines are approved by Health Canada. They have met all the requirements for approval. These vaccines was tested on a large number of people. Experts are closely monitoring any adverse reactions that could occur following vaccination and taking measures to ensure the safety and effectiveness of these vaccines.

In most cases (more than 50% of people)	Pain at the injection site	<ul> <li>Apply a cold, damp compress at the injection site.</li> <li>Use medication for fever or discomfort if needed.</li> <li>See a doctor if symptoms are severe.</li> </ul>
Very often (less than 50% of people)	<ul> <li>Headache, fatigue*</li> <li>Fever or shivering</li> <li>Joint pain</li> <li>Muscle soreness</li> <li>Diarrhea or vomiting</li> <li>Swollen armpit lymph nodes</li> </ul>	
Often (less than 10% of people)	Redness or swelling at the injection site. This reaction could appear more than 1 week after vaccination	
Rarely (less than 1 person in 1,000)	Facial swelling	
Very rarely (around 2 persons in 100,000)	Myocarditis or pericarditis following vaccination**	See a doctor if you develop chest pain, palpitations or shortness of breath.

<sup>\*</sup> The majority of youth aged 12 to 15 years experience fatigue or a headache. Fatigue, headache, muscle and joint pain are more common after the 2nd dose.

Approximately 2 persons in 100,000 can have a severe allergic reaction after receiving this vaccine. The frequency of this reaction is higher than usually expected after a vaccine, but it is still very rare.

We recommend that you stay at the clinic at least 15 minutes after vaccination because allergic reaction may occur. If an allergic reactions occurs, the symptoms will appear a few minutes after vaccination. The person giving the vaccine will be able to treat this reactions immediately.

<sup>\*\*</sup> In young people aged 12 to 29 years, this risk may be lower with the Pfizer vaccine. Myocarditis or pericarditis occur more frequently in young males under the age of 30 following the 2<sup>nd</sup> dose. For the Moderna vaccine, the frequency is approximately 8 times higher after the 2<sup>nd</sup> dose than after the 1<sup>st</sup> dose (approximately 17 cases per 100,000 doses versus 2 cases per 100,000 doses respectively). Cases present most often with mild symptoms and recover quickly.
